What's in a Name? Part Two.

Continuing the work that was begun with "The House on Mango Street," the first "Savage Jazz" sessions with JMCA visiting artist Rica Anderson began with student names.

Students were asked to make shapes and gestures from their first and last names. They did movement exercises that showed how to use different levels of space by making high, medium, and low shapes.

The students then were asked to make a collaborative dancing machine that connected all of their name movements.
